Attachment Glossary

Ainsworth Strange situation – a procedure involving short separations from and reunions with the parent that assesses the quality of the attachment bond

Anxious—avoidant attachment — a type of insecure attachment in which the infant readily separates from the caregiver but avoids contact after a separation

Anxious-resistant attachment – a type of insecure attachment in which the infant separates from the caregiver reluctantly but shows ambivalence toward the caregiver after a separation

Attachment – an enduring emotional tie between an infant and a caregiver

Bonding – the parent's initial emotional tie to the newborn

Greeting reactions – positive reactions of infant when the caregiver appears

Secure attachment – a pattern of attachment in which the infant is confident of the caregiver's availability and responsiveness, can use the caregiver as a secure base for exploration, and can use the caregiver as a source of comfort when upset

Secure-base behavior – behavior in which the infant uses the caregiver as a base for exploration

Separation distress – negative reaction of infant when the caregiver temporarily leaves

Patterns of Attachment Ainsworth's Strange Situation

Secure	Infant is confident of caregiver's availability and responsiveness, and can use caregiver as secure base for exploration. Most (60-70%) infants show this.	
Anxious- resistant		
Anxious- avoidant	Infant readily separates from caregiver and avoids contact after a brief separation.	

Main added another attachment style:

Disorganized-	Infant shows contradictory features of several
disoriented	patterns of anxious attachment or appears dazed
	and disoriented.
