<u>Course Description.</u> The course is designed to provide students with a comprehensive, chronologically organized, up-to-date picture of child development from conception through adolescence. We will focus on important concepts and issues in the study of development, major theories of development, and current research findings. In addition, there will be an emphasis on the nature of scientific inquiry in developmental psychology.

<u>Goals and Objectives.</u> The main goal of this course is to provide students with knowledge and skills so that they can better understand and evaluate information about human development. Upon completion of this course students should be able to demonstrate knowledge of psychological theories, concepts, and research in the area of human development and be able to apply this knowledge to various issues related to human development.

<u>Text and Lectures.</u> You are assigned almost the entire Dehart et al. text to read. You are also assigned the entire Delcampo and Delcampo text to read. The tentative schedule tells you more specifically when to read the chapters. Lectures and multi-media presentations will supplement the text and will not necessarily follow along with the chapters.

**Exams.** There will be **THREE** multiple-choice exams. The three examinations will cover the assigned readings in the text, lectures, multi-media presentations, and student presentation. Exams will consist of multiple-choice questions and will assess your command of facts as well as your ability to **APPLY CONCEPTS**. Scan-tron sheets will be used for testing so be sure to come to each test with a pencil. If you are ill or have some other documentable, legitimate reason for missing an exam (see excused absences below), you may be permitted to take a make-up. However, you **must** notify me **NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M.** the day of the exam (or earlier, see excused absences) or you will get **NO CREDIT FOR THE EXAM**.

During exams, you will only be permitted to have pens, pencils, and erasers at your desk. Please leave refreshments, book bags, and other materials in the front of the classroom or do not bring them at all. Turn off all cellular phones and beepers and please do not wear hats. You **may not leave the room** during an exam.

<u>Makeup Exam Procedures</u>: On the Sarasota campus makeup exams are only administered on four predetermined dates and times during each semester. These dates and times cannot be altered for your individual schedule – NO EXCEPTIONS. Therefore, if you qualify for a makeup exam make sure to see Dr. Ruva ASAP to schedule your exam.

**Excused Absences** will be given for **illness** only with a **doctor's excuse** (*this illness must be severe enough to prevent you from taking the exam – Your instructor alone will determine if your illness meets this criterion*), for the death of an immediate family member, for school sanctioned functions, or for observance of religious holy days. Doctor's excuse require that the student fill out a "Verification of Visit" form at the health center. Something similar should be done for students using private physician services and must state specifically what the illness was and the date/s of the illness. Death of an immediate family member requires a copy of the death certificate. Students who anticipate the necessity of being absent from class due to the observation of a major religious observance or a school-sanctioned event **must provide notice of the date(s) to the instructor, in writing, by the <u>second class meeting</u>. If no notice is given the student will get no credit for the exam.** 

<u>Cheating</u> - DON'T!! Academic dishonesty will result in an "FF" for the course and a recommendation for disciplinary action by USF.

**Presentations and Papers.** Each student is required to give a **PRESENTATION** on one of the issues debated in the DelCampo and Delcampo text. There are 2 sides to each issue. Therefore, for the presentation each student will be assigned to either the "Yes" or "No" side of the issue and will be presenting with another student. **Sign up** for the issues will take place during the **second class meeting**. Those students who are not in attendance on that day will be assigned an issue by your professor. Students are also required to write a **PAPER** on their assigned issues that covers both sides of the debated issue. A detailed description of the presentation and issue paper requirements will be distributed by the 2<sup>nd</sup> class meeting. Issue papers are due no later than the beginning of class **March** 

 $26^{\text{TH}}$ . The first set of presentations will take place on March  $5^{\text{TH}}$ . See the tentative outline for lectures and readings below to locate your presentation date.

<u>Academic Honesty</u>. Academic honesty is an essential component of the academic process. Both students and faculty are expected to "live up to the highest ethical standards with respect to the origin of ideas, the accuracy of data, and like matters" (Bryant, 2002).

<u>Academic Dishonesty:</u> Per the USF Undergraduate Catalog (p. 47-49) Academic Dishonesty includes **PLAGIARISM**, which is defined as:

"literary theft and consists of the unattributed quotation of the **exact words** of a published text, or the unattributed borrowing of **original ideas by paraphrase** from a published text. On written papers for which the student employs information gathered from books, articles, web sites, or oral sources, each direct quotation, as well as **ideas and facts that are not generally known to the public at large**, or **the form**, **structure**, **or style of a secondary source** must be attributed to its author by means of the appropriate citation procedure."

<u>Plagiarism Detection</u>: The University of South Florida has an account with an automated plagiarism detection service which allows instructors to submit student assignments to be checked for plagiarism. Your papers will be submitted through **Safe Assign**. Assignments are compared automatically with a huge database of journal articles, web articles, and previously submitted papers. The instructor receives a report showing exactly how a student's paper was plagiarized. Any plagiarism in this course will result in an "**FF**" for the class and a recommendation for disciplinary action by USF SM.

<u>**Grading.**</u> Grading for this course will be on an accumulated point scale as follows: Exams 1 through 3 are worth <u>100</u> points each and the Presentation and Paper are worth a total of <u>100</u> points. Therefore, the total possible points a student can earn in the class (not including extra credit) is <u>400</u>.
